



TIFFANY GREENE PLAY-BY-PLAY

Tiffany Greene is a play-by-play commentator for ESPN, covering a variety of collegiate sports including basketball, football, softball and volleyball. She is the first African-American woman to serve as a play-by-play commentator for college football on ESPN.

Greene has called a number of postseason games including the NCAA Women's Division I Basketball Tournament, NCAA Softball Regional and Super Regionals, as well as NCAA Volleyball Regionals.

Greene originally began working with ESPN as a college football sideline reporter in 2012. She has since worked on the Women's College World Series, Air Force Reserve Bowl on ABC and multiple bowl games.

Prior to ESPN, Greene honed her skills as a play-by-play

announcer and sports reporter at Bright House Sports Network in the Orlando and Tampa Bay markets. During that time, she was the play-by-play announcer for the inaugural season of BIG EAST women's basketball on Fox Sports 1.

Greene is a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., Links Incorporated and the National Association of Black Journalists. She began her on-air career in 2004 as a one-man band reporter at WJCL/WTGS, and later, WTOC in Savannah, Georgia.

Greene earned her Bachelor's degree in Broadcast Journalism from the Florida A&M University. She serves as the FAMU School of Journalism & Graphic Communication Board of Visitors co-chair.



WALKER ANALYST

Jay Walker joined ESPN in 2005 as a college football analyst. He has called the ESPNU Thursday Night games for the last four years, in addition to a studio analyst for the last two years. He has also been an analyst on College Football Overdrive.

Walker started his television career with BET and then joined the now defunct MBC Network from 2002-05.

Out of college, Walker was drafted in the seventh round in 1994 by the New England Patriots, where he played for two seasons. He also spent two years with the Minnesota Vikings.

Walker was drafted out of high school to be a pitcher in the California Angels organization's minor league team, one of a handful of players to play both minor league baseball and in the NFL. While playing in the minors, Walker decided to pursue his passion for football and was recruited as a quarterback to Long Beach State and eventually transferred to Howard University after football was cut as a sport at Long Beach. At Howard, Walker led the team to their first playoff berth in team history and was named an All-American, to the All-MEAC Team twice and was the I-AA football player of the year by Sports Illustrated. That year, 1993, Howard earned its only undefeated season in program history.

A native of Los Angeles, Walker is a 1994 graduate from Howard with a political science degree. In 2005, he was inducted into the Howard University Athletics Hall of Fame, and most recently, he was named to the MEAC/SWAC All-Time Greatest Team.

Currently, Walker is CEO and President of Walker Financial Services and has been a member of the House of Delegates in Maryland since 1997. He serves on the House Ways and Means Committee and its education and finance resources subcommittees. He is also a member of the Legislative Black Caucus of Maryland.



TIFFANY BLACKMON REPORTER

Tiffany Blackmon is a college football sideline reporter who joined ESPN in the fall of 2021. Blackmon previously spent more than five years with NFL Media as a reporter and Atlanta-based correspondent for NFL Network, contributing field reports for NFL Network's shows, including NFL Total Access, Around the NFL, Path to the Draft, NFL GameDay Morning and more.

Prior to joining NFL Media, Tiffany worked as an anchor and reporter for Comcast SportsNet Houston. Her responsibilities included covering the Houston Rockets and co-hosting their weekly All-Access show, as well as covering the Houston Texans, the University of Texas, Texas A&M and Baylor. Tiffany also served as the host of SportsNet Reports.

Blackmon also worked at the NBC affiliate KFOR-TV in Oklahoma City, where she covered the Oklahoma City Thunder as well as football at the University of Oklahoma and Oklahoma State. Her previous experience includes serving as Sports Director at KXXV-TV in Waco, Texas and Weekend Sports anchor at KPLC-TV in Lake Charles, Louisiana.

Born in Attleboro, Massachusetts, and raised in Atlanta, Blackmon graduated from Georgia State University in Atlanta with a degree in journalism and telecommunications. She was a four-year letterwinner for the Panthers in women's soccer.

ABOUT THE SWAC

The Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) is considered one of the premier HBCU conferences in the country and currently ranks among the elite in the nation in terms of HBCU alumni playing with professional sports teams.

Current championship competition offered by the league includes competition for men in Baseball, Basketball, Cross Country, Football, Golf, Indoor Track and Field, Outdoor Track and Field and Tennis.

Women's competition is offered in the sports of Basketball, Bowling, Cross Country, Golf, Indoor Track and Field, Outdoor Track and Field, Soccer, Softball, Tennis and Volleyball.

SWAC QUICK FACTS

The Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) is a collegiate athletic conference headquartered in Birmingham, Alabama, which is made up of historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs) in the Southern United States. It participates in the NCAA's Division I for all sports; in football, it participates in the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS), formerly referred to as Division I-AA.

On the gridiron, the conference has been the biggest draw on the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) level of the NCAA, leading the nation in average home attendance for 44 of the 45 seasons. In 1994, the SWAC fell just 40,000 fans short of becoming the first non-Football Bowl Subdivision conference to attract one million fans to its home games.

THE HISTORY OF THE SWAC

In 1920, athletic officials from six Texas HBCUs — C.H. Fuller of Bishop College, Red Randolph and C.H. Patterson of Paul Quinn College, E.G. Evans, H.J. Evans and H.J. Starns of Prairie View A&M, D.C. Fuller of Texas College and G. Whitte Jordan of Wiley College — met in Houston, Texas, to discuss

common interests. At this meeting, they agreed to form a new league, the SWAC.

Paul Quinn became the first of the original members to withdraw from the league when it did so in 1929. When Langston University of Oklahoma was admitted into the conference two years later, it began the migration of state-supported institutions into the SWAC. Southern University entered the ranks in 1934, followed by Arkansas AM&N (now the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff) in 1936 and Texas Southern University in 1954.

Rapid growth in enrollment of the statesupported schools made it difficult for the church-supported schools to finance their athletics programs, and one by one they fell victim to the growing prowess of the statesupported colleges. Bishop withdrew from the conference in 1956, Langston in 1957 and Huston-Tillotson (formerly Samuel Huston) in 1959, one year after the admittance of two more state-supported schools: Grambling College and Jackson State College.

The enter-exit cycle continued in 1961 when Texas College withdrew, followed by the admittance of Alcorn A&M (now Alcorn State University) in 1962. Wiley left in 1968, the same year Mississippi Valley State College entered. Arkansas AM&N exited in 1970 and Alabama State University entered in 1982.

Arkansas-Pine Bluff (formerly Arkansas AM&N) rejoined the SWAC on July 1, 1997, regaining full-member status one year later. Alabama A&M University became the conference's tenth member when it became a full member in September 1999, after a one year period as an affiliate SWAC member. Most of the former SWAC members that have left the conference are currently a part of the Red River Athletic Conference of the NAIA. Howard University became a charter member in women's soccer prior to the 2014 season.

In 2021, SWAC membership expanded to 12 institutions with the additions of Florida A&M

University (Tallahassee, Fla.) and Bethune-Cookman University (Daytona Beach, Fla.).

- Create collaborative process in which the "new vision" for the SWAC is a shared vision that is all inclusive.
- 2. Increase corporate partnerships.
- 3. Create Regional Television Network.
- Engage with past SWAC "greats" to assist with branding of conference.
- Strengthen officiating in all sports, with emphasis on revenue generating and high profile sports.
- Improve championships for studentathletes and fans so they can receive a "First Class Experience" (locations, gifts, entertainment).
- Establish and maintain excellent relationships with city, state, and corporate partners.

Eddie Robinson, Walter Payton, Jerry Rice, Doug Williams, Deacon Jones, Robert Brazille, Steve McNair, Aeneas Williams, and Michael Strahan are just a few of the legendary names of the game that attended SWAC member institutions, and the list doesn't stop there.

On the hardwood, the SWAC helped foster the talents of Naithsmith Hall of Fame member Willis Reed (Grambling State), Avery Johnson (Southern), Bobby Phills (Southern), Zelmo Beaty (Prairie View A&M), Lindsey Hunter (Jackson State) and legendary coaches Ben Jobe and Dave Whitney, just to name a few.

Mid-Eastern Athletic he Conference (MEAC) enters its 52nd year of intercollegiate competition with the 2022-23 academic school year. Located in Norfolk, Va., the MEAC is made up of eight outstanding historically black institutions across the Atlantic coastline: Coppin State University, Delaware State University, Howard University, University of Maryland Eastern Shore, Morgan State University, Norfolk State University, North Carolina Central University and South Carolina State University.

The MEAC sponsors 14 Division I (FCS) sports: women's bowling, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's track & field, softball and volleyball. The MEAC receives automatic NCAA qualification bids in seven sports - men's and basketball, women's women's bowling, men's and women's tennis, softball and volleyball. The MEAC's football champion is pitted against the champion of the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) in the Cricket Celebration Bowl, which debuted in December 2015.

In 1969, a bold ad hoc group of innovators long associated with

intercollegiate athletics met in Durham, N.C. to discuss the feasibility of organizing a new conference. From these discussions, they formed a steering and planning committee to fully investigate the idea, presented a detailed report with recommendations to interested collegiate institutions, and constructed a workshop to outline proposals.


The conference was confirmed in 1970, kicking off its first season of competition in football in 1971.

On June 8, 1980, the MEAC was classified as a Division I conference by the NCAA; prior to that year, the conference had operated on the Division II level. The month after achieving Division I status, the MEAC received automatic qualification to the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship. Currently, the conference has automatic qualifying bids for NCAA postseason play in men's basketball (since 1981), women's basketball (since 1982), softball (since 1995), men's and women's tennis (since 1998), volleyball (since 1994) and women's bowling (since 2018).

In 2015, the MEAC combined with the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) for the Celebration Bowl in Atlanta, Ga. North Carolina A&T State defeated Alcorn State in the inaugural Celebration Bowl to determine the Black College National Champion in a game pitting the MEAC and SWAC champions. North Carolina Central represented the MEAC in the 2016 Celebration Bowl, taking on Grambling State.

North Carolina A&T State returned to the Celebration Bowl in 2017, defeating Grambling State 21-14 to complete the first undefeated season in MEAC history and claim the Aggies' second Black College National Championship in three years. In 2021, South Carolina State defeated heavily favored Jackson State 31-10 to give the Bulldogs their first Cricket Celebration Bowl title and the MEAC a 5-1 record in the bowl game.

The MEAC also has a strong presence in the National Football League (NFL), both throughout the league's history and today. For the start of the 2022 season, there were 12 former MEAC players on active NFL rosters—highlighted by South Carolina State's Darius Leonard (2018 NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year, two-time Pro Bowler) and Decobie Durant (2022 fourth-round draft pick).

CELEBRATION BOWL

hen Jackson State battles North Carolina Central for the National Black College Championship in the Cricket Celebration Bowl on Saturday, Dec. 17, this matchup will feature two of the best quarterbacks among Historically Black Colleges and Universities — Shedeur Sanders from Jackson State and Davius Richard from North Carolina Central.

Sanders completed 30-of-43 passes for 320 yards and four touchdowns leading Jackson State to a 43-24 win over Southern to capture back-to-back Southwestern Athletic Conference championships landing a spot in the Celebration Bowl. Sanders, a 6-2, 215-pound sophomore, was chosen Offensive Player of the Year in the SWAC as he has put together a terrific season with 36 TDs and 3,403 yards.

He will look to connect with wide receivers Shane Hooks and Dallas Daniels. Hooks, a 6-4, 205-pound senior, leads the Tigers with 59 receptions for 705 yards and 10 TDs. Daniels, a 6-1, 180-pound graduate student, has 60 catches for 666 yards and six TDs.

While Sanders and the JSU offense garner all the attention, the Tigers come



into the Celebration Bowl with the top defense in the nation. Led by SWAC Defensive Player of the Year Aubrey Miller Jr., the Tigers' defense leads the FCS in scoring defense, total defense, passing defense, and third down conversions allowed.

Jackson State head coach Deion Sanders has the best offense in the league. The Tigers averaged 38.0 points a game. Coach Sanders will be on the sidelines for his final game as the head coach of Jackson State, as he has accepted the head coaching position at the University of Colorado. Coach Prime led his team to a perfect 12-0 record and a second SWAC title. He was named SWAC Coach of the Year for the second straight season.

Richard, a 6-3, 215-pound junior, has played extremely well under center for NCCU. He led the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) with 2,486 yards, 24 touchdowns and 13 rushing TDs. The first-team All-MEAC selection guided the Eagles to the conference title while helping them post a 9-2 overall mark.

The team has two great pass catchers with E.J. Hicks and Devin Smith. Hicks, a 5-11, 180-pound redshirt senior, has 30 catches for 529 yards and seven TDs. Smith, a 5-10, 185-pound sophomore, has 35 receptions for 496 yards and six TDs.

Eagles head coach Trei Oliver, who was named the MEAC Coach of the Year, has an offense that's capable of lighting up the scoreboard. They led the MEAC in scoring, averaging 38.4 points a game, while leading the nation in thirddown efficiency.

NCCU will be making its second trip to the Celebration Bowl. In 2016,

Grambling State edged NCCU, 10-9, in a tightly played contest. A year ago, South Carolina State defeated Jackson State, 31-10, in the Tigers' first trip to the big game. The MEAC holds a 5-1 lead in the series. With signal callers like Sanders and Richard this could be a high scoring affair for the fans.

THOMAS HUDSON PRESIDENT

Alma Mater: Jackson State University Thomas K. Hudson, J.D. was named President of Jackson State University on November 19, 2020, by the Board of Trustees of State Institutions of Higher Learning, after serving as Special Assistant to the President and Chief Diversity Officer.

Under President Hudson's leadership, JSU's freshmen class has nearly doubled since Fall 2020, one of the largest increases in the Mississippi Institutions of Higher Learning system. JSU also secured the successful decennial review of its regional accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC). JSU also retained its High Research designation by the Carnegie Classification of Institutions of Higher Education.

This fiscal year, the Division of Research and Economic Development received \$102 million in external grant funding, marking a significant increase over the previous fiscal year, where the Division garnered \$54.4 million in research awards, including more than \$11 million from the National Institute of Minority Health and Health Disparities, to establish the RCMI Center for Health Disparities Research.

The university also became the first HBCU to launch a Financial Wellness Center to educate students on financial literacy,

preparing them for economic success. President Hudson has also been instrumental in developing collaborations offering students real-life experiences and providing the world with a diverse talent pipeline, as seen in JSU's partnerships with FedEx, Mississippi College and American Airlines.

President Hudson is determined to keep education affordable. During the world's most challenging time, he ensured JSU was the only state institution of higher learning that did not see a tuition increase and covered student tuition balances during Fall and Spring 2020.

Under President Hudson's direction, JSU's financial resources have been fortified, increasing the cash on hand by over 100% during his tenure. Alumni giving rates have also improved dramatically. Fiscal Year 2020 ended with 3.7%. By 2021, the rate jumped to 9.81%, ending Fiscal Year 2022 at a 13.5% giving rate.

A long-standing champion of education, President Hudson's goals remain to enhance the university's legacy and expand its global footprint while fortifying its mission to produce ethical and technologically advanced global leaders.

Thomas Hudson and his wife Phylandria have two girls, Abigail and Josephine.



ASHLEY ROBINSON VICE PRESIDENT & DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Alma Mater: Mississippi Valley State University In his fifth year in leading athletics, Vice President / Director of Athletics Ashley Robinson continues to lead Jackson State University to new heights.

In 2022 Robinson received the prestigious 2021–2022 Cushman & Wakefield Athletic Director of the Year award by the National Association of College Directors of Athletics (NACDA).

Always visionary, three of Robinson's football hires, all first-time college head coaches at the time, earned postseason play in Fall 2021. Willie Simmons, whom Robinson hired at Prairie View A&M in 2015, led Florida A&M to an atlarge berth in the FCS Playoffs. Eric Dooley, who Robinson hired to replace Simmons prior to the 2018 season, led Prairie View A&M to a SWAC Football Championship game appearance.

Robinson and JSU leadership named Pro Football Hall of Famer Deion Sanders as head coach of Jackson State in Fall 2020. The transformational hire of Sanders has led JSU to a 27-5 record in three seasons with back-to-back SWAC Championships.

Robinson has led JSU athletics to 15 championships during his tenure, including historic titles highlighted by men's basketball (2021), baseball (2021), football (fall 2021, fall 2022), and women's basketball (spring 2022) going undefeated in conference play.

Before JSU, Robinson, a native of Jackson, Miss., spent five years at Prairie View A&M University (PVAMU), where he was named director of athletics in June 2013, and promoted to Vice President and Director of Athletics in November 2016.

A former student-athlete, he was a four-year letterman in basketball and is the single-season and career recordholder in assists after playing point guard for Mississippi Valley State University.

Robinson's career in athletic administration as an academics and compliance in roles at Delaware State, Jackson State, Mississippi Valley State, the Southwestern Athletic Conference office, and Prairie View A&M before becoming Athletic Director.

Robinson was named athletic director at Mississippi Valley State in 2012, where he spent nine months leading Delta Devil Athletics leading MVSU to five conference titles while designing the Harrison HPER Complex.



SEASON RECAP



The Tigers went 8-0 in Southwestern Athletic Conference play for the second straight year and won back-to-back league championships for the first time since 1995–96.

A total of 14 people affiliated with Jackson State Football earned Southwestern Athletic Conference honors. Head Coach Deion "Coach Prime" Sanders was named SWAC Coach Of The Year, QB Shedeur Sanders was named Offensive Player of the Year, LB Aubrey Miller Jr. was named Defensive Player of the Year, and WR Kevin Coleman Jr. was named Freshman of the Year.

Sanders and Miller were two of seven JSU players named first-team All-SWAC, along with RB Sy'veon Wilkerson, WR Dallas Daniels, OL Tyler Brown, DL Nyles Gaddy, and S Cam'Ron Silmon-Craig.

A total of five players earned second-team All-SWAC honors: WR Shane Hooks, TE D.J. Stevens, DE Justin Ragin, CB Isaiah Bolden, and K Alejandro Mata.

Jackson State opened the season with a 59-3 win over Florida A&M in the Orange Blossom Classic. QB Sanders completed 29 of 33 passes for 323 yards with five touchdown passes and no interceptions. The Tigers returned an interception, a fumble, and a blocked punt for touchdowns in the contest.

Special teams and defense led the way in JSU's 16-3 win over Tennessee State in the Southern Heritage Classic. Mata converted three field goals in the win, Gaddy recorded a career-high 3.5 sacks, and Sanders passed for 276 yards and one touchdown.

Jackson State opened its home schedule with a week three 66-24 non-conference win over Grambling in the W.C. Gorden Classic. Sanders accounted for a career-high six touchdowns (four passing / two rushing) in throwing for 357 yards. Wilkerson rushed 23 times for 141 yards and two touchdowns.

The Tigers completed the month of September with a 49-7 home win over Mississippi Valley. Sanders passed for a career-high 438 yards and four touchdowns. Daniels caught 10 passes for 142 yards, and the defense limited MVSU to nine first downs.

JSU then posted back-to-back conference road wins. In a 26-12 win at Alabama State, Sanders passed for 336 yards and three touchdowns, and

the defense limited Alabama State to 177 total yards as JSU football won its the 500th game in program history.

The Tigers continued to roll in a 48-8 win over Bethune-Cookman. Sanders passed for 272 yards and five touchdowns. Jackson State's defense and special teams combined to record three safeties to tie an NCAA record.

Jackson State then downed Campbell 22-14 to post a homecominggame victory. Wilkerson rushed for 116 yards and one touchdown, and Miller anchored the defense with a game-high 13 tackles, one sack, and two tackles for loss.

In the first of two meetings with Southern, JSU beat the Jaguars 35-0. Sanders totaled 246 yards and three touchdowns, including tying a career-high with two rushing touchdowns, while Wilkerson rushed 21 times for 96 yards and a touchdown. The defense held Southern to 10 first downs and 221 yards total offense.

Jackson State opened the month of November with a 41-14 win at Texas Southern. Wilkerson rushed for a career-high 216 yards and two

touchdowns, and Sanders accounted for four total TDs in the win. Miller tied a career-high with 19 tackles.

The Tigers then posted a 27-13 win over Alabama A&M to win the SWAC Eastern Division Title in the Gulf Coast Challenge. Sanders threw four touchdown passes, and WR/CB Travis Hunter caught a touchdown pass and made an interception. Miller recorded 17 tackles with a pass breakup and fumble recovery.

Hunter pulled off a rare double again in the 24-13 win at Alcorn. Hunter returned an interception for a touchdown and caught a touchdown pass in the game, and Ragin recorded a career-high three sacks.

Jackson State won its second straight SWAC Championship with a 43-24 win over Southern. Sanders threw for 320 yards and four touchdowns to earn Offensive MVP honors. Miller made five stops with a sack and three tackles for loss to earn Defensive MVP honors. The defense recorded a season-high five takeaways (three INTS, two FR) to help send the Tigers back to Atlanta.

eion Sanders has always been a game-changer. In his tenure as Head Football Coach of Jackson State University, Sanders has again changed the game for Tigers' Football, the Department of Athletics, the University as a whole, the Southwestern Athletic Conference, College Football and the Nation.

As the Southwestern Athletic Conference played a spring 2021 football season due to the coronavirus, the number 21 Sanders donned on his way to a Pro Football Hall of Fame career became immersed at JSU.

Sanders, named as the 21st head coach in the proud history of JSU football on September 21, 2020, led the Tigers in his first game as head coach on

most impactful and recognizable brands nationwide.

After a 4-3 spring 2021 record, Sanders led Jackson State back to championship glory in Fall 2021 with a school-record 11-win season and the first Southwestern Athletic Conference football championship since 2007. JSU went undefeated in conference play (8-0) and won nine consecutive games to complete the regular season en route to the SWAC Championship and the program's first-ever berth in the Celebration Bowl.

Jackson State set an FCS record for attendance in Fall 2021, averaging more than 42,000 fans per home game.

Coach Prime was named SWAC Coach of the Year, FCS Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year, BOXTOTOW National Coach Of The Year, and Black College Hall of Fame Coach Of the Year in 2021. Freshman QB Shedeur Sanders shone brightly in the national spotlight as his father, as he was named as the FCS Jerry Rice Freshman of the Year after passing for 3,231 yards and 30 touchdowns with only eight interceptions.

In Fall 2022, JSU posted its first-ever 12-0 regular season and again went 8-0 in SWAC play.

A fierce advocate for additional exposure and a level playing field for all Historically Black Colleges and Universities, Sanders has continued to push for opportunities to highlight talent in the SWAC and across the culture. In March 2022, Sanders held a Pro Day featuring athletes from four other

schools in the state of Mississippi to provide a platform in front of 22 NFL teams and the Canadian Football League. In April 2022, Jackson State became the first HBCU to have its spring football game televised live nationally on ESPNU.

The influence of Coach Prime has directly impacted Jackson State football. DE/LB James Houston IV came to the program and became a dominant player for JSU in 2021. This past April, Houston IV was a sixth-round pick by the Detroit Lions in the NFL Draft, and recorded two sacks in his first career game on Thanksqiving Day.

In December 2021, wide receiver / cornerback Travis Hunter, the top high school prospect in the nation, signed a national letter of intent with Jackson State football and enrolled at JSU in spring 2022. The JSU Football impact and influence continued into Summer 2022 as Coach Prime, Shedeur, and Travis were featured on the cover of the July issue of Sports Illustrated.

An eight-time Pro Bowler, nine-time All Pro, and two-time Super Bowl champion, Sanders played 14 NFL seasons and nine seasons of Major League Baseball. Sanders is the only athlete to play in both a Super Bowl and a World Series.

Among his accolades, Sanders set an NFL record with 19 return touchdowns in his career and was the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year in 1994.

In 2011, Sanders was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame and the National Football Foundation's College Football Hall of Fame.

Prior to leading Jackson State, Sanders had been coaching for over a decade. Sanders was the offensive coordinator at Trinity Christian School in Cedar Hill, Texas, leading the Tigers to three-straight Texas Association of Private and Parochial Schools (TAPPS) titles and a 42-3 record.

Following through on a long-standing goal, in 2020 Sanders graduated from Talladega College with a bachelor's degree in Business Administration with an emphasis in Organizational Management.

He is the proud father of five children: sons Deion Jr., Shilo, and Shedeur, and daughters Deiondra and Shelomi.







DR. JOHNSON O. AKINLEYE CHANCELLOR

Alma Mater Alabama A&M Johnson O. Akinleye, Ph.D., was appointed the 12th chancellor of North Carolina Central University (NCCU) on June 26, 2017.

Under Akinleye's leadership, NCCU's enterprise has expanded significantly. He has led the development of five new major capital projects, including a new student center, a new school of business, and three new apartment-like residence halls. Akinleye was instrumental in securing NCCU's designation as a Millennial Campus, making NCCU the first historically Black college and university in the University of North Carolina System to gain the designation as a single institution.

With a focus on increasing the institution's sponsored research and grants, Akinleye invested in NCCU's research institutes, which generated \$149 million in grants and other funding for sponsored research in the five years ending June 30, 2022.

Akinleye joined the University of North Carolina System after nearly two-and-a-half decades of senior administrative service in public, private and church-affiliated institutions. He started his NCCU journey serving as provost and vice chancellor for Academic Affairs. In that role, he established the Office of Faculty Professional Development, the Office of e-Learning and a state-of-the-art Fab Lab. He successfully increased full-time student enrollment and expanded the university's academic degree offerings.

Akinleye is well known as a motivational speaker, consultant, writer, editor and documentarian who has produced works for independent and government agencies, including the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA). He serves on several boards, including Made in Durham, RTP Foundation, The 50 Group and the Watauga Club.

Akinleye holds a bachelor's degree in telecommunications and a master's degree in media technology from Alabama A&M University, and a doctorate in human communications studies from Howard University. He has attended numerous leadership training programs, such as the Fellow in the Millennium Leadership Initiative (MLI) Institute and the Harvard Graduate School of Education for Leadership, Management and Administration of Higher Education, and has received numerous recognitions and awards for teaching and service.

He is married to Juanita Akinleye, a registered nurse, and they have two adult children, Nikki and Peter.

Alma Mater NCCU Veteran athletics administrator and North Carolina Central University alumnus Dr. Louis "Skip" Perkins began his tenure as the university's Director of Athletics on June 1, 2022.

A dynamic higher education leader with more than 20 years of experience in intercollegiate athletics and institutional advancement, Perkins has served as Director of Athletics at three different NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) institutions with teams capturing 10 conference championships during his tenure.

A 1994 graduate of NCCU, Perkins holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in political science and master's degrees in public administration and instructional media, also from NCCU. He earned his Doctor of Education from Delaware State University, with a focus on educational leadership.

As a four-year team captain on NCCU's tennis team, Perkins received multiple academic all-conference honors. He was also a recipient of NCCU's inaugural Forty Under Forty Alumni Awards in 2012, and is a member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc., the NCCU Alumni Association, Inc., and the United States Professional Tennis Association.

Perkins joined NCCU from his role as assistant vice president for development at Morgan State University since 2020.

Under his leadership, he worked in conjunction with the president of the university and the MSU Foundation Board to secure more than \$67 million in fundraising contributions during the 2020–2021 academic year, which set a new university record.

Prior to his role as senior development officer at Coppin State University, Perkins was the associate vice president and director of athletics at Delaware State University from 2015–17. During that time, the Hornets secured four Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) championships, boasted the highest grade point average (3.1) in the athletics program history, and more than \$5 million was raised in athletics development.

As director of athletics at Howard University from 2010–15, Perkins oversaw more than \$10 million of renovations to Burr Gymnasium, while the Bison added another conference title to his ledger. In the same role at the University of Arkansas-Pine Bluff from 2007–10, the Golden Lions achieved one of the highest graduation rates in school history and won five conference championships under his leadership.

He is the proud father of three children, Alexia Perkins, Peri Perkins and Louis Tripp Perkins, along with a granddaughter, Anastasia.



SEASON RECAP

he 2022 North Carolina Central University football team achieved several historical milestones on the way to the Cricket Celebration Bowl in Atlanta.

The Eagles captured their first Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) championship in six years, earned a top-25 national ranking for the first time in five years, and will be making NCCU's second appearance in the Celebration Bowl.

NCCU ended the regular season ranked No. 21 in the FCS Coaches Poll with an overall record of 9-2, becoming just the sixth team in school history to win nine games in a season.

The Eagles posted a 4-1 conference record and captured non-conference FCS victories over North Carolina A&T (Big South), No. 25 New Hampshire (Colonial), and Tennessee Tech (Ohio Valley).

Among the NCAA Division I-FCS statistical leaders, NCCU tops the nation in third down conversions (57.3%) and red zone defense (64.7%), and ranks sixth in the country in scoring offense with a MEAC-high average of 38.4 points per game. The Eagles scored 40 points or more in three straight games for the first time in 37 years, and they have scored more than 40 points in six of 11 games this season, including three 50-point performances.

NCCU's explosive offense is led by junior quarterback Davius Richard. The seven-time MEAC Offensive Player of the Week ranks fifth in the nation (FCS) in points responsible for 20.4 points per game, and 12th in total offense with 288.8 yards per game. Richard tops the MEAC in passing yards (2,486), passing touchdowns (24), and rushing touchdowns (13), which are the most by any quarterback in NCCU history.

Richard needs 13 pass completions in the Celebration Bowl to break the NCCU single-season record held by Michael

Johnson (196 in 2011), and is three passing touchdowns away from surpassing the single-season record held by Stafford Brown (26 in 2006).

Among NCCU's all-time quarterbacks, Richard ranks second in career passing yards (6,639), career passing touchdowns (51) and career total offense (7,938), trailing only NCCU hall of famer Earl "Air" Harvey (1985-88).

For his efforts, Richard was voted to the All-MEAC First Team, along with senior offensive lineman Robert Mitchell, junior running back Latrell Collier, junior offensive lineman Corey Bullock, sophomore center Torricelli Simpkins III, junior defensive back Khalil Baker and junior kicker Adrian Olivo.

All-MEAC Second Team honors were presented to senior receiver E.J. Hicks, sophomore receiver Devin Smith, senior tight end Tyler Barnes, sophomore defensive lineman Jaden Taylor, senior defensive lineman Colby Warrior, sophomore linebacker Jaki Brevard and junior defensive back Manny Smith.

COACHES

ith 20 years of college coaching experience that includes six conference championships and three black college football national titles, Trei Oliver returned to his alma mater as North Carolina Central University's 24th head football coach, the university announced on Dec. 13, 2018.

A native of Yorktown, Virginia, Oliver earned all-conference and all-region honors as a defensive back and punter during his four-year playing career at NCCU from 1994–97. The 1998 graduate later returned to NCCU as an assistant coach from 2003–06, helping the Eagles to back-

to-back Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association (CIAA) championships in 2005 and 2006.


Oliver returned to NCCU as head coach after spending the previous three seasons (2016–18) as the defensive coordinator and safeties coach at Southern University.

In the prior 15 seasons (2004–18) as a coach at four different universities, Oliver was a part of only one season with fewer than seven wins. During that time, he has celebrated 124 victories for an average of more than eight triumphs per year and a winning percentage of .725.

Prior to Southern University, Oliver served as the outside linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator at North Carolina A&T State University from 2011–15, when the Aggies shared consecutive Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) championships in 2014 and 2015, and were declared the black college football national champions in his final campaign in Greensboro as winners of the Celebration Bowl with a 10-2 overall record.

In four seasons at Grambling State University from 2007-10 as the outside linebackers coach, recruiting coordinator and special teams coordinator, the Tigers earned two SWAC West division crowns, and won the SWAC championship game and a black college football national title in 2008 with an 11-2 record.

Oliver's first coaching stint at NCCU was as a defensive backs and wide receivers coach, recruiting coordinator and special teams coordinator from 2003-06. The Eagles captured back-to-back CIAA championships with consecutive trips to the NCAA

Division II playoffs in 2005 and 2006, and were crowned as the black college football national champions following an 11-1 season in 2006.

Oliver started his college coaching career at Delaware State University as defensive backs coach and assistant special teams coordinator from 1999–2002.

As a student-athlete at NCCU, Oliver twice led the CIAA in punting, including a 41.7-yard average in 1997, which ranks fifth on the Eagles' all-time single season list. As a junior in 1996, he was part of a defensive backfield that led the nation (NCAA Division II) in pass defense efficiency. As a senior, he landed two positions on the All-South Region Team, earning First Team honors as a defensive back and a Second Team selection as a punter.

Among NCCU's career leaders, Oliver ranks 13th with 234 tackles (126 solo), 12th with 31 passes defended (24 pass break-ups and seven interceptions), and fourth with a 39.3-yard punting average. He garnered All-CIAA first or second team honors in each of his four seasons.

Oliver graduated from NCCU in 1998 with a bachelor's degree in physical education. He earned a master's degree in criminal justice from Grambling State University in 2010.

Both of his parents, Colon and Evelyn Oliver, are also NCCU graduates. His father played football as a wide receiver at NCCU from 1963-66.

He and his wife Yvette, also an NCCU graduate, are the proud parents of a son, Reggie.



JACKSON STATE UNIVERSITY

THE SONIC BOOM OF THE SOUTH

BAND DIRECTOR | DR. RODERICK LITTLE



Although Dr. F. D. Hall served as director of the band, chorus, and orchestra in the 1920s, the marching band began in the 1940s consisting of students from both Jackson State College and Lanier High School under the direction of Mr. Kermit Holly Sr. The Jackson State University Marching Band, affectionately known as the "Sonic Boom of the South" is known for intricate, precision marching and the big band sound. The "Sonic Boom" also referred to as "Hollywood's Band of Choice," has performed many halftime appearances for the NFL/NBA including the Atlanta Falcons, Detroit Lions, New Orleans Saints, Cincinnati Bengals, and the NBA All-Star game in 1991. The "Boom" was featured in a television special for Motown's 30th Anniversary and the 34th NAACP Image Awards, with a special guest performance by "Cedric the Entertainer." In May 2013, the band was featured in a Headline News special chronicling what it takes to become a drum major at Jackson State University. Since 2020, the band has been featured in several media outlets, a nationally televised Pepsi commercial, featured on YouTube, and the virtual inauguration of President Joseph R. Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris.

Students in the band dubbed the Jackson State University Marching Band The "Sonic Boom of the South" in 1971. "The thrill of a thousand eyes," were the words spoken by Dr. Jimmie James, Jr. at the onset of the "Prancing Jaycettes" in 1971. Shirley Middleton, a former majorette, initiated the concept of the majorettes abandoning their batons and dancing to popular musical selections. As the majorette sponsor, Shirley Middleton and the majorettes met with Dr. John A. Peoples, the University's sixth president, and requested that they be permitted to "put down their batons." In 1974, the band's theme song, "Get Ready," an old Motown favorite, was selected and three years after that, the "Tiger Run-On" was perfected. The "Tiger Run-On" is a fast, eyecatching shuffle that brings fans to their feet during halftime performances.









THE SOUND MACHINE

The Sound Machine is the official marching band of North Carolina Central University (NCCU), a master's level comprehensive institution located in Durham, N.C. that offers undergraduate, graduate and professional degrees in the arts, sciences, business, law and education programs. The band has been led by Jovan Alexander Wilson since 2022.

The history of NCCU's marching band dates back to the 1930s when Dr. Stephen Junius Wright, an assistant professor of education at then North Carolina College in Durham, was asked to organize the first marching band with 25 musicians. Since inception, the Sound Machine has experienced substantial growth and national recognition through performances, including the 1960 inauguration for then Governor of North Carolina, James Terry Stanford, 1961 half-time game for New York Giants-Dallas Cowboys, six appearances at the Honda Battle of the Bands in Atlanta, Ga., participation in the 122nd Rose Parade in Pasadena, Calif., and the 100th Anniversary of the Aggie-Eagle Classic, the Duke's Mayo Classic game, in Charlotte, N.C., in 2022.

Mercedes-Benz Stadium before a bowl record 48,653 fans. Traditionally known for their great defensive units, South Carolina State held Jackson to Celebration Bowl lows in team rushing yards (19) and total yards (194), and their defensive effort resulted in the largest victory margin (21 points). The Tigers bolted out to a 7-0 first quarter lead on Shedeur Sanders' seven-yard strike to Keith Corbin III, with 7:24 left. S.C. State would then catch fire, outscoring the Tigers, 31-3 over the final three periods, seizing control of the game for good in the second quarter with a 10-point flurry in the final minutes, on a Corey Fields six-yard strike to Shaquan Davis with 2:08 left, followed by a 26-yard field goal by Gayvn Zimmerman with eight seconds left in the half. SCSU's Fields tossed four scoring passes, finishing with 164 yards (12 of 31, one INT), while JSU's Sanders passed for 175 yards (16 of 36, two INTs). SCSU's Shaquan Davis was the Bowl's Offensive MVP with five catches for 95 yards and three scores — a Celebration Bowl record. Decobie Durant earned Defensive MVP honors. Records fell

captured its second straight win and its fourth overall championship title. N.C. A&T and Alcorn were meeting for the second consecutive year and the third time in the five-year history of the event. Celebration Bowl records established, among others, were most points combined (108), most points in a quarter (49), most touchdown passes in a quarter (4 by NC A&T's Kylil Carter), most TDs in a game (6 by Carter), and most combined total yards (1,034). A&T quarterback Kylil Carter, the Celebration Bowl offensive MVP, had six touchdown passes — three in the third period — to tie an Aggie program record in leading his squad to the victory. He finished 18-30 for 364 yards, hitting four different receivers for touchdowns. Jacob Roberts, with six tackles including one for a loss, and an interception, was the game's defensive MVP. Alcorn scored first in this contest and led 10-7 with 10:16 left in the half. After the Aggies took at 24-10 lead into halftime, both teams exploded for a combined 49 points (seven TDs) in the third quarter. The Aggies, who scored on eight straight

possessions, including seven touchdowns, needed only 13 seconds in the second half

North Carolina A&T and Alcorn State combined to set















this time under first-year head coach Sam Washington. The Aggies win gave the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) a 3-1 advantage in the bowl. The Aggies jumped out to a 17-6 lead through the first half of play, but Alcorn state scored 10 unanswered points in the third quarter to pull within one at 17-16. But just as the Braves appeared to have momentum, the Aggies' Malik Wilson took the kickoff at his 12, got to the outside and raced untouched for an 88-yard touchdown that put his team ahead 24-16. Alcorn State QB Noah Johnson led his team on a nine-play, 92-yard touchdown drive to move to 24-22 and put the Braves in a position to tie with a successful two-point conversion. On a run-pass option, Johnson rolled out and found Chris Blair for what appeared to be the tying 2-point conversion; however, it was called no good as he juggled the ball while going out of bounds. The Braves, despite the loss, rolled up 451 yards total offense, including 328 yards on the ground. Johnson completed 12-21 passes for 123 yards and ran for 120 yards and two

touchdowns on 14 rushing attempts. De'Shawn Waller led the Alcorn running attack with 167 yards. A&T's Raynard was named Offensive MVP, while Aggies free safety Richie Kittles picked up Defensive MVP honors.

2017 Celebration Bowl. It was one of the most highly anticipated matchups of the year. The Aggies were undefeated (11-0) heading into the Celebration Bowl, with staple wins on the road over non-conference opponents Gardner-Webb and UNC-Charlotte. Grambling, riding an 11-game win streak after dropping their first game of the season, was returning to the Celebration Bowl for a second straight season, defeating North Carolina Central in 2016. After a scoreless first quarter, both teams were able to put seven points on the board in the final five minutes of the half. But it was the Aggies who would strike first and last in the second half. Marquell Cartwright, who earned Offensive MVP honors, raced 29-yards for his second touchdown of the game, to give North Carolina A&T a 14-7 lead in the third. They would seal the victory in the final 1:42 with a seven-play, 56-yard drive, capped off by a one-yard touchdown run by quarterback Lamar Raynard. Franklin McClain III was the defensive MVP. With the win, the Aggies completed a

perfect 12-0 season, while the loss dropped Grambling's final 2017 record to 11-2. The Aggies became the first MEAC team to compile a 12-0 campaign, including the postseason.

yards, including a 32-yard scoring run that put Grambling ahead 7-3 midway in the third. Jackson recorded five unassisted tackles and a key interception.







ERIC N. MOORE

he college athletics world in general and the Historically Black College and University (HBCU) sports world in particular lost an integral part of its fabric with the passing of Eric Moore on Saturday, November 19, 2022.

Though his colleagues and friends knew that he had been battling health issues for more than a year, his passing in Raleigh, N. C. as the 2022 football season was coming to a close still came as a shock.

Eric was a consummate professional and media expert who for more than four decades worked for, served the interests of and covered athletic programs and conferences throughout the country, especially HBCUs. He was an ubiquitous presence in press boxes and press rows across the HBCU sporting landscape and beyond, always performing some necessary task towards the success of the event.

He is fairly credited with being the person "who brought HBCU sports to the internet" for his pioneering efforts in utilizing computer technology for compilation of scores and game statistics, website construction and maintenance. For that, he was widely known as "The Guru."

Eric's contributions were indispensable. His presence will be greatly missed and his absence profoundly felt.

He started his company, the Onnidan Group - named after his mother Onnie and father Dan - in the early 1980s to compile and distribute scores of HBCU games. While a communications professor at Fayetteville State University, this Durham, N. C. native, NC State graduate and Air Force veteran brought to bear all his skills and expertise in media and technology in taking over sports information duties for the Broncos. His contacts with other HBCU SIDs led to the founding of the Black College Sports Information Directors Association, also known as BC-SIDA, a subsidiary of CoSIDA (College Sports Information Directors of America). From its inception, Eric served as executive director of BC-SIDA and helped organize and promote black college SIDs and their institutions until his health started to fail.

With a background in radio production and marketing, Eric started the Onnidan.com website, also known as Black College Sports Online, just as the internet began to explode in the early 1990s. It was the first major outlet and for many years the only site for comprehensive coverage of HBCU sports on the internet. In many ways it helped birth the explosion of HBCU coverage that is now so prevalent on the web.

One of the anchors on the Onnidan.com platform has been my Black College Sports Page. There would be no BCSP without Eric. He was an indispensable part of the beginning of the syndicated publication in 1994 and continued as a valuable advisor, contributor

and traveling companion with me to all things HBCU sports for over two decades. He was also the webmaster that faithfully posted the BCSP each week on Onnidan.com for the past 28 years.

Eric, many times along with his wife Betty and daughter Nikki, spent countless hours on the road providing his services to numerous institutions. He also trained a legion of students and professionals, particularly sports information directors and their helpers, in the practice of gathering computer generated statistics. It ended the laborious task of collecting statistics manually and is now universally the standard. The Onnidan Group performed statistical services as well as website construction and maintenance for athletic departments in all four HBCU conferences (CIAA, MEAC, SIAC and SWAC) as well as for high school, HBCU and NCAA tournaments and championship events, television broadcasts and athletic endeavors large and small.

The CIAA inducted him into its John McLendon Hall of Fame in 2019 for his numerous contributions.

In Matthew 25:21 it says: "The master said to him, 'Well done my good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a little; I will set you over much. Enter into the joy of your master."

That's my prayer for Eric. That he be rewarded for all the good he did, the countless people he trained, taught, mentored, encouraged and helped. Those people include me.

Rest in peace, my friend.


